Thousands of Holy Name Members Pay Homage at Tomb of Washington.

Allegiance to America and to the highest ideals of freedom and justice were solemnly pledged at the tomb of George Washington, at Mount Vernon yesterday, by many thousands of Holy Name men and their guests, who stood reverently about the tomb while Very Rev. Peter Guilday. Ph. D. professor of church history at the Catholic University, emphasized the crusade that is being waged by the Holy Name Society for God and country.

Coupled with the homage paid the Coupled with the homage paid the day before to these in the silent city of the hero dead at Arlington, who gave their lives and sacrificed their all that the Nation might live, the Holy Name men have by these two pilgrimages attested at two of the Nation's most sacred shrines their patriotic zeal.

Cardinal Places Wreath.

At the tomb of Washington, as he did the day before at the tomb of the "Unknown Dead" in Arlington National Cemetery, Cardinal O'Connell, acting as personal representative of Pope Pius XI and for all of the federated Holy Name bands, laid a floral wreath.

At the tomb of the father of his country, as at the tomb of the Ur known Dead, and as again today at the foot of the Monument, the Holy Name men and their guests renewed fervently with bared heads the Holy Name pledge and sang "The Star Spangled Banner."

Loyalty Is Stressed.

Holy Name convention delegates in a pilgrimage to Mount Vernon yesterday were urged to pledge their fealty anew to the Nation by Dr. Guilday, when he sounded a warning that the very structure of our Government is in graver danger today than at any time in history. Even in the days before and during the Civil War, he said, the Nation was never so pregnant with the causes of destrucpregnant with the causes of destruc-tion to the unity of country as it is

today.
"It is not enough for them to visit Arlington and kneel at the shrine of the Unknown, or to pray for the preservation of the Republic, or to pay homage at the Tomb of Washington." Pather Guilday said, for "when all this is done, your work as men of the Holy Name is but begun. You are to take out of these precious days. Holy Name is but begun. You are to take out of these precious days of pilgrimage renewed faith in America's providential place in the historic evolution of the human race and renewed realization that where the vision of God and of God's law is being lost by so many millions of our fellow citizens, the Nation must undoubtedly perish."

Of the few who seem to care, many are fatalists, who, having filled their own granaries with material abundance, compla-cently say, with Louis XV, 'After me,

CARDINAL BOGGIANI NAMED PROTECTOR

The Holy Name Society in the United States enjoys the distinction of having a cardinal protector who represents the religious interests of the organization in the Roman Curia. On September 18, 1917, Pope Benedict XV, recognizing the great work of the society in the United States, named Pius Cardinal Boggiani, to be the first cardinal protector of the "Confraternity of the Most Holy Name of God" in the United States. Cardinal Boggiani was born on January 19, 1863, in the town of Boscomarengo, northern Italy. He entered the order of preachers in 1878. After his ordination to the priesthood he labored as a missionary in Constantinople. Later he became prior of the monastery at Ragusa, afterward he became regent of studies in the Dominican house of studies at Graz. His next office, the pastorate of the Santa Maria di Castello Church in Genoa. At the same time his brilliant talents were manifested in the loogy which he taught at the diocesan seminary of that city.
