U. S. COTTON ESTIMATES ARE DECLARED UNJUST. Senator Harris, Georgia, Says \$40 Drop Per Bale Means Exchanges Will Be Regulated.

Complaint has been made to the Department of Agriculture that its report of cotton crop estimates has unjustly depressed the market.

"Cotton has dropped \$10 a bale without any reason," he said. "In the State of Georgia the crop deterioration was twice as great as the department's report, and I have reason to believe that this condition exists throughout the belt."

LONE WAR NUN SEES MEED PAID SISTERS

Veteran Nurse at Unveiling of Tablet Here to Nurses of Civil War.

Snatched back from almost complete oblivion, the memories of the services to the Nation during the Civil War by the Catholic Sisters of the United States...

Speakers had come and gone, they had done the space of 82 years that had elapsed before official recognition was made of the sacrifices and services of the sisters during the war.

Cardinal Praises Sisters. William Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, addressed the assembly. He praised the sisters who had taken part in the great conflict of the Civil War.

Sherrill Pays Tribute. In accepting the monument for the Government, Col. Sherrill said in part: "These members of 12 orders of nursing sisters, by the devotion of their entire lives to unselfish service to humanity without any possibility of earthly reward or aggrandizement, always inspire a feeling of admiration in our hearts, tinged somewhat with sadness, perhaps, at the thought of the great sacrifices these women are called on to make in separating themselves for all their lives from home, family and friends."

Impressive group of 12 figures on the face of this memorial, he declared, "representing each of the 12 orders of sisters who gave their splendid services, must necessarily have a lasting and deep significance to all those who come here throughout the course of the future generations to bow their heads in token of reverence for the exalted services and sacrifices of self here portrayed."

Notables Are Speakers. Other speakers on the program were Michael Donohoe, national president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians; Archbishop Curley of Baltimore; Ambrose Kennedy, former member of the House of Representatives from Rhode Island; who introduced the bill permitting the Government grant of land for the monument; Very Rev. Charles L. O'Connell, C. S., provincial of the fathers of the Holy Cross; Mrs. Adella Christy, national president of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Ancient Order of Hibernians; Rev. Dr. William A. Scullion, J. C. D., and Rt. Rev. Dr. William A. Hickey, Bishop of Providence.

Among those on the platform were Cardinal O'Connell, Postmaster General New, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court McKenna, the Apostolic Delegate to the United States, Archbishop Fumasoni-Biondi, Archbishop Curley of Baltimore, Lieut. Col. C. O. Sherrill, Admiral Benson, Bishop Busch of St. Cloud, Bishop Hickey of Providence, Rev. Father Buckley, pastor of St. Matthew's, and other clergy.

HEADS SCRANTON GROUP. Bishop Brennan Helped Make Diocese One of Most Active.

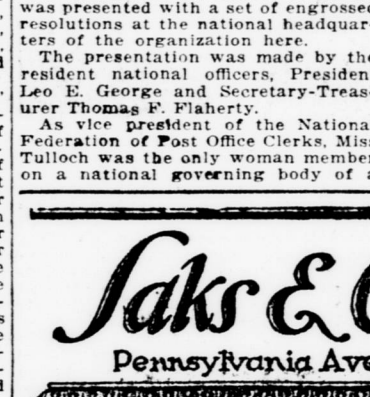

Holy Name Society Condemns Bodies Promoting Intolerance Expresses "Utter Abhorrence" of Organizations Seeking to Deny Rights Guaranteed by Constitution.

A resolution expressing "utter abhorrence" of an organization "which seeks to deprive any person or group of persons from the exercise of the inalienable rights guaranteed to them under the Constitution" as subversive of the institutions of this Republic was adopted by the Holy Name convention last night.

Reiterating the principles of the Holy Name Society and the high ideals of that organization, the resolutions stated that we are devoted to the provisions of the Constitution of the United States granting freedom of speech, freedom of the press and freedom of the practice of religion to all the people of this country.

"We express a deep feeling of gratitude for our Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, successor of St. Peter and vicar of Christ upon earth, for the countless blessings bestowed upon us, his spiritual children, in a special way, are we, members of the Holy Name Society, indebted to the Holy See for the latest and most signal evidence of his fatherly interest manifested in the appointment of a legate extraordinary to preside over the deliberations of this convention.

"We thank his eminence, William Cardinal O'Connell, D. D., Archbishop of Boston, for being present and presiding at our conference and congratulate him upon having the distinction of being the first legate extraordinary appointed by the Holy Father to act in such capacity.

"To his grace, Michael J. Curley, D. D., Archbishop of Baltimore, we accord full credit for the efficient expedition of the work of this convention. We regard with much pleasure the growth and extension of the Catholic University of America, which is a worthy successor of that distinguished prelate, Cardinal Gibbons, of reverend memory.

"The Catholics of America hold in great esteem that splendid monument to the love of the higher education, the Catholic University of America, an infant among universities, the delegates to this convention regard with pride the fine and symmetrical group of buildings and the edifice of proposed increased facilities in the new buildings in course of construction.

"To his grace, Cardinal Boggiani, we would convey our grateful acknowledgment of his helpful cooperation and his expressed good wishes contained in his timely telegram to our National Spiritual Director Rev. M. J. Ripple, O. P.

"To his grace, Leo XIII on May 20, 1896, in answer to 14 years of incessant pleading on the part of Father McKenna, so dispensed with the Clementine constitution as to leave the establishment of Holy Name societies in the hands of the hierarchy.

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CARDINAL BOGGIANI NAMED PROTECTOR

The Holy Name Society in the United States enjoys the distinction of having a cardinal protector who represents the religious interests of the organization in the Roman Curia. On September 19, 1924, Pope Benedict XV, recognizing the great work of the society in the United States, named Pius Cardinal Boggiani, to be the first cardinal protector of the "Confraternity of the Most Holy Name of God" in the United States.

The pastor-professor was a man of unusual executive ability. This was recognized by Pius X, who charged him with the task of apostolic visitor to a number of dioceses in Italy, notably the archdiocese of Bologna.

He was promoted to be titular archbishop of Edessa and sent as apostolic delegate to Mexico. He remained there but two years, and returning to Rome, had occasion to witness the splendid work of the society. While staying for a short space of time with the Dominican Fathers at St. Vincent Ferrer's Convent, New York, having returned to Rome, he was chosen apostolic administrator of the archdiocese of Genoa on March 19, 1914.

Created Cardinal. He was created cardinal priest by the same Pope on December 4, 1918, and assigned the titular church of S. S. Quirico and Giulitta. In 1919 he was appointed Archbishop of Genoa. After two years he retired to Rome to take up his duties in the Roman Curia.

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
