#### Our speaker is Dr. Julia A. Lamm

(Associate Professor, Department of Theology, Georgetown University).

Julia A. Lamm received her B.A. in History and in Philosophy from The College of St. Catherine, and her A.M. in Religious Studies and Ph.D. in Theology from the University of Chicago. She has been on the faculty at Georgetown University since 1989. She works in the history of Christian thought, specializing in the doctrine of God, grace, and mysticism. She is author of *The Living God: Schleiermacher's Theological Appropriation of Spinoza* and is editor of *The Wiley-Blackwell Companion to Christian Mysticism*. She is currently writing three other books: *Julian of Norwich on Revelation and Grace; Schleiermacher's Plato: The Construction of a New Platonism;* and *Forms of Grace in the Western Christian Tradition*.
